












# Cases completed in 2022


# **Duration of civil litigation in 2022** (months)



# Rate of appeal in the first instance for judgements on the merits rendered in 2021











# **Convictions and Settlements since 1986**






# Convictions in 2022¹ (excluding settlements) Felonies, misdemeanours, 5th Class petty offences (excluding police tribunals)




















# Referrals of minors in prosecutable cases




# Variation in the criminal response rate = (d+e+f)/b









### Activity of administrative courts in 20221


#### Activity of the 42 administrative tribunals
